Message from the Executive

Director – Yolanda Perez

Committed to strengthening and supporting positive child outcomes for those families most in need, it is with great pleasure to present this annual report, reflective of the collective dedication and support received by the AKA Head Start Board of Directors, Policy Committee, staff, parents, and community partners. These strong efforts began with



the founding of AKA Head Start in 1971 by Dr. Geneva Roberts, with the sponsorship of the Epsilon Xi Omega Chapter of the Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, San Diego Chapter. Holding steadfast support for over 40 years during constant changing regulations and program trends, AKA Head Start continues the legacy of being committed to ensuring that every child's family leaves empowered for a better life.

Research shows evidence of the gains a quality preschool experience has on a child, family, and community. To this end, studies reveal Head Start could increase high school graduation by 7% and has an average return of \$9 dollars for every \$1 dollar invested. ⁱ AKA Head Start impacts at the local level includes employing over 200 employees and generating over \$2,000,000 in revenue for San Diego vendors in purchased goods and services.

A noted program year success for 2013-2014 includes the launch of the Early Head Start program. AKA Head Start began the 2013 school year serving 128 infants and toddlers in center-based, home-based, and family child care settings. As with Head Start, the program is based on a "whole child" approach, recognizing that parents are the child's primary teacher, and that family engagement plays a major role in a child's success in school and life.

As a prior Head Start parent, I am forever grateful for the support my children and I received. My story is one of hundreds of Head Start success stories from past parents and students who succeeded in school and life, and now have the opportunity to pay it forward. Proud of our accomplishments, we are excited about sharing our successes in this annual report. Dedicated to a comprehensive early learning agenda to promote school readiness by closing the achievement gap, we look forward to the upcoming success stories still to be told.

Agency Background

Across the nation, Head Start/Early Head Start programs have been providing comprehensive child development services to children and families since 1965. Head Start places special emphasis on promoting children's school readiness in the areas of language and cognitive development, early reading and mathematic skills, and social and physical development. The Early Head Start program was established to serve children under three years of age, in recognition of evidence that the early years are critical to children's overall growth and development. Our program is federally-funded, tuition free, and primarily provides services to children from low-income families. Parents in our program are empowered to be leaders and teachers, as well as advocates for their families, children's educations, and in their communities.

Alpha Kappa Alpha Head Start began serving children and families in San Diego County in 1971. The organization began with a modest enrollment of 80 children, at Encanto Head Start. As a delegate under the oversite of Neighborhood House Association, the agency relocated to East County in 1978, where they began providing Head Start services in El Cajon and Lakeside. The agency was the first Head Start provider in East County.

The Epsilon Xi Omega, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, San Diego Chapter, sponsors the program, and comprises the majority of Board members. We are grateful for their continued support, as well as their donations to the community.

Over the years, the agency has grown tremendously. We have gone from serving 80 children, to serving more than 1,000 children and their families annually. The agency has grown from three to thirteen sites, with an annual budget of more than 12 Million Dollars. Our impact on the community continues today, and we are proud to enrich the lives of children and families in the East San Diego County area.

Mission and Vision of Alpha Kappa Alpha Head Start

Mission: The mission of Alpha Kappa Alpha Head Start is to partner with families to ignite the spark of hope and desire in each of them to achieve their maximum potential as productive members of society. To this end, we provide quality traditional and non-traditional child development services.

Vision: Every Child's Family Leaves Empowered for a Better Life.



About Head Start/ Early Head Start



Program Description

Head Start is based on the premise that all children share certain needs, and children from low-income families, in particular, can benefit from a comprehensive child development program designed to meet those needs. Head Start is family-oriented, comprehensive and community-based, offering support for parents in their work and child-rearing roles, as well as linkages to other community services.

AKA Head Start/Early Head Start is staffed with more than 200 full-time employees, with locations at 13 centers throughout the East County of San Diego. Program options include center based, home-based (services offered at the family's home), Family Child Care (services offered at a contracted, licensed, family child care home), and Combination Option (services offered at both the center and family's home).

Head Start

Head Start provides comprehensive services for children ages 3 to 5, and their families. Head Start encourages the role of parents as their child's first and most important teachers. Programs build relationships with families that support positive parent-child relationships, family well-being, and connections to peers and community. Services include:

- Promoting school readiness of young children;
- Health and Nutrition services;
- Social Services for the family;
- Developmental and Behavioral Screenings.


Early Head Start

The Early Head Start program (adopted in July 2013) was established to assist infants and toddlers to age 3. The goals of Early Head Stat are:

- To provide safe and developmentally enriching caregiving which promotes the physical, cognitive, social and emotional development of infants and toddlers, and prepares them for future growth and development;
- To support parents in their role as primary caregivers and teachers of their children, and families in meeting personal goals and achieving self sufficiency across a wide variety of domains;
- To mobilize communities to provide the resources and environment necessary to ensure a comprehensive, integrated array of services and support for families.



Comprehensive services include social services, education, health, nutrition, disabilities, mental health, and parent involvement opportunities.



ACTUAL AGES OF CHILDREN ENROLLED


The graph above depicts actual ages of children enrolled in the AKA Head Start Program. The average monthly enrollment for the program year was 1,046, representing 100% of the Funded Enrollment.

Head Start Enrollment

AKA Head Start was funded for 1,046 children, serving a cumulative total of 1,191 children and 1,135 families. The funded enrollment represents a service level of 14% of the eligible children in San Diego East County.

HEAD START LANGUAGE AND ETHNICTY OF ACTUAL ENROLLMENT

Of the 1,191 children served in Head Start, 389 (33%) identified Spanish as their primary language spoken at home. The other categories include English, Middle Eastern and South Asian Languages, East Asian Languages, Pacific Island Languages, European and Slavic Language, and the African Languages.




The graph above depicts actual ages of children enrolled in the AKA Early Head Start Program. The average monthly enrollment for the program year was 128, representing 100% of the Funded Enrollment.

Early Head Start Enrollment

AKA Early Head Start was funded for 128 infants/toddlers, serving a cumulative total of 167 children and 157 families. The funded enrollment represents a service level of less than 2% of the eligible children in San Diego East County.

AKA Early Head Start children maintained 100% Average Monthly Enrollment. The graph below depicts the Early Head Start funded enrollment by option.


Early Head Start - Funded Enrollment by Option






LANGUAGE AND ETHNICTY OF ACTUAL ENROLLMENT

Of the 167 children in Early Head Start, 65 (39%) identified Spanish as their primary language spoken at home. The other categories include English, Middle Eastern and South Asian Languages, East Asian Languages, and the African Languages.


The above financial information was obtained from our most recent audited financial statements for the fiscal year ending June 2014.

AKA Head Start had a successful two-week unannounced audit by the Office of Head Start in 2012 with a follow up in February, 2013. The program is proud to report there were no deficiencies and follow-up verified program findings were corrected.

AKA Head Start had a tri-annual Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) audit in January, 2014. The results reflected program strengths and opportunities for program improvements. There were no deficiencies or significant findings.



BUDGET DESCRIPTION



KINDERGARTEN READINESS AND CHILD OUTCOMES

AKA Head Start uses scientific, research-based curricula for environmental set-up, use, and strategies. Our children are taught through the use of Creative Curriculum.

AKA Head Start tracks each child's development within the Five Essential Domains of development; cognitive, language and literacy, approaches to learning, social-emotional, and physical.

The education staff, in partnership with parents, set age and skill appropriate goals for the children, using an observation -based assessment tool (DRDP-2010). The DRDP-2010 assessment is completed three times a year to measure child outcomes success over a period to ensure children leave the program ready for school.
